The FULLNESS of God

Eph 3:19



... that you may be filled to all the fullness of God. (Eph 3:19b NASB)

- The words "fill" (Gr. plēroō) and "fullness" (Gr. plērōma) occur eight times in Ephesians.
- Paul prayed that his readers would grow into the fullness of God (and Christ), that is, the very essence of God himself (Eph 3:14-19; [cf. Bar 5:7]; 4:11-13; 2 Pet 1:3-4).
- Just as Christ did what was pleasing to the Father, so our goal should be to become like the FATHER.

The AGENT

He who descended is the one who also ascended far above the heavens, that he might fill all things. (Eph 4:10 ESV)

- The verb "fill" (Gr. plēroō) is passive ("be filled") in three of its four occurrences in Ephesians. Who, then, fills us?
- The one who fills all things (his church and his creation) is Jesus Christ himself, and the church becomes his fullness, that is, his body (Eph 1:15-23; 4:7-10; cf. 3:17).
- We must allow ourselves to be filled up to the fullness of God, and the one who fills us must be the SON.

The MEANS

And do not get drunk with wine, for that is debauchery, but be filled with the Spirit. (Eph 5:18 ESV)

- Many assume that the Spirit is what fills us, but the context suggests that Christ fills us by the Spirit (Eph 5:18; cf. 3:16-17; Rom 8:4; Gal 5:14; Col 3:16).
- When we allow Christ by the Spirit to fill us, the results are obvious (Eph 5:19-21; cf. 4:14-16; 2 Pet 1:5-11).
- The SON fills Christians so that they attain to the fullness of the God the FATHER, and he does so by the SPIRIT.

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
